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2014 20" Club Hall of Fame






Recommended Reading 2015

Flyfishing Northern New England's Seasons

Much has been written about the many famous American flyfisheries, but relatively little has been logged regarding the glorious brook-trout and landlocked salmon water of northern New England. Thanks to long-time fishing guide Lou Zambello, we'll soon be enlightened. Covering Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont and western Massachusetts, Zambello relates years of flyfishing and guiding experience through observations, instructions and anecdotes. From iceout through summer, fall spawning runs and back to winter - for lakes as well as rivers and streams, all conditions and strategies are covered. You'll learn the proper conditions to try new tactics like dead-drifting a streamer versus twitching dry flies, and much more. He relates stories from such famous waters as the Kennebec, Penobscot, Grand Lake Stream, Rapid, Presumpscot, Androscoggin, and Deerfield Rivers, and Rangeley, Moosehead and Sebago Lakes, and many more throughout the region. Iceland 2015 - Atlantic Salmon and Sea-Run Brown Trout

Weatherby's offered its first international fishing trip in 2014 to fish the leaendary waters of Iceland for Atlantic salmon and sea trout. The adventure, by all accounts was a resounding success with all anglers catching salmon and trout, and producing more fish than the season average by other anglers fishing the same water. We will be returning to Iceland again in 2015 to fish the same rivers - Haukadalsa for salmon and the Eldvatn for sea trout, and spending

Myvatn, Akayuri and the Thvera, a tributary to the Haukadalsa. The outcome was fishy with fresh water browns, sea run arctic char, sea run browns and Atlantic salmon. The erupting volcano in east central Iceland added to the adventure although there was no real threat from the event, that is actually still ongoing.





North Woods Grouse Camp 2015

Most grouse hunters put down their shotguns by the end of October, even though grouse hunting season runs through to the end of December. Typically early November can provide some of the best grouse hunting of the season with cold temps and good visibility in the woods. We will be hunting the first two weeks of November 2015, guiding small parties of hunters in the "big woods" of northern Maine.

Grouse populations tend to run high in this region of the state with some days producing 30+ grouse flushes. We will be renting some rustic spike camps in the Allagash region that will be able to accommodate a party of four adults. The hunts will be fully guided and outfitted 2:1, meals included. The cabins are clean, comfortable and warm. There will be no running water or electric-



ity, adding to the ambiance of the hunt. This is a hunt for the hunter that loves grouse hunting and can live without all the modern amenities. If you are interested in joining us on a hunt, you will not be disappointed. The Allagash Country will lure you deeper and deeper into the wilderness and the rewards from hunting, comraderie, wildlife sightings and overall experience will be first rate. We were challenged during our 2014 hunt with a couple of early snows but the wildlife sightings were good - including moose, Canada Lynx, coyotes, fisher, snowshoe hare, snow buntings, ravens, bald eagles and numerous other bird species. Consider joining us in 2015 for this unique wilderness hunting opportunity.

Drift the St. Croix River

In recent years, we have been exploring new waters within striking distance of Weatherby's and one of the options we offer now is a drift boat trip on the St. Croix River, fishing for smallmouth bass mid-season and landlocked salmon early season. We depart the lodge after breakfast and return in time for supper. The St. Croix is the international boundary between New Brunswick, Canada and Maine and is a National Heritage River for New Brunswick. It is wild, undeveloped and scenic - lined with tall white pines, spruce and fir. The water is pool -drop with endless options

for catching smallmouth on the fly or spinning gear. Enjoy a lunch packed by the lodge on the river bank or share a cookout lunch with your family. We can also take double ended canoes or kayaks. Easy whitewater will greet you along the way providing a memorable way to spend the



Other options exist to canoe/kayak and fish several sections of the Machias River, Old Stream, Tomah Stream and others for wild brook trout and smallmouth bass. So if are looking for a variety of fishing

opportunities that reach beyond the traditional fly fishing on Grand Lake Stream for salmon or smallmouth fishing from Grand Lake Canoes on Big Lake, West Grand, Wabassus, Machias, Grand Falls Flowage or any of our other tradi-
